As a result of their courageous service in Vietnam, they were awarded the Valorous Unit Award. This was in recognition of the 105 killed in action and the more than 400 who were wounded in action and received the Purple Heart medal. This unit award was made during the time he was serving in Vietnam, especially during the year of 1968. According to their website from 1965 – 1970, this Battalion was in combat for five continuous years, including 13 service campaigns.

Jim has a sign positioned in the back of his pickup truck honoring this award. It is a reminder to him and to us that service to our country and his fellow servicemen was more important than himself.
