Team Hammer (76E) has been fully engaged in many FOB projects that include emergency repairs for aviation facilities, roads, ammo holding area and TOCs. 

Commander's Corner

The 502nd is finally getting our feet underneath us over here in Afghanistan, out theater specific training is complete and we've begun to work. Since last month, the company has split operations between two locations; 2nd platoon at Kandahar and the rest of the company at Leatherneck. We've started to receive the equipment; we'll need to start bridging both from theater provided stock and what we've shipped from the rear. The lack of equipment hasn't stopped the Soldiers of the Deuce from keeping busy; it's made them more creative.

2nd platoon has been extremely busy as the only company element at Kandahar. They've been on a two reconnaissance missions so far, each of which has a high potential for turning into a bridging mission. 2nd has also assumed the role of receiving all the 502nd equipment that's shipped into theater and getting it shipped out to Leatherneck. They're also serving as the liaison for the rest of the company by assisting incoming personnel from back home in getting training, equipment and transportation, as well as the movement of all other 502nd Soldiers in theater. No small task, but they're handling it flawlessly.

The Leatherneck crew is equally busy. First platoon has been putting the finishing touches on their platoon area and structures, and giving much needed assistance to the Navy Seabees by way of motivated, highly skilled labor.

Though most of platoon is comprised of bridge crewmembers, they're proving their true Army Engineer spirit by helping the Seabees with some earthmoving projects and horizontal construction projects. They've also augmented a recent reconnaissance with some of their Soldiers to an extremely high profile bridge site which has the potential to greatly increase the Marines freedom of movement in the area.

Team Hammer Family,

We continue to knock out projects and set the pace for construction among all supporting units at FOB Spin Buldak. September was a fulfilling month because we closed out a lot of big projects. For instance, we completed the Stryker squadron 50'x90' TOC and the Strykers were able to move in and start directing their operations from the permanent building that they needed. Additionally, we finished the permanent ECP to control traffic entering the FOB.

As both platoons finished large projects, they transitioned smoothly to new construction tasks. I/15th started work on the permanent ammo storage facility and gained experience in reshaping terrain as they took action to start on the large-scale drainage plan for outside the FOB. 2/76th started work on the second 50'x90' TOC building which will provide operations space to the remaining infantry and cavalry units here.

I mentioned last month that $2/76^{\rm th}$ has been doing a lot of carpentry around the FOB to expand the basic infrastructure – like building out

a PX. Well, this month they built a permanent PX container complete with deck. SGT Brand, SPC Cummings, and PFC Parks amazed everyone with the high-quality trim, shelves, and sign they put on the PX. 2nd Platoon also finished a barbershop container for a local barber. The main effort of 2nd Platoon has been the second 50'x90' that they are building. I/15th started off strong on the permanent ammo storage area and was raising the foundation. The main effort has shifted for 1st Platoon in October and the platoon is busy building an enlarged and re-designed refueling area for helicopters. The platoon has also been engaged with graveling the new Team Hammer motorpool and just started preparing the land for the permanent TOC building for 76th.

Interview #1

Hello all, I recently traveled up to Frontenac for a command visit to the 60th Engineer Company, from Fort Benning, GA. That is where I found two of the three participants for this interview. For this issue I interviewed SPC Kristin Pineda, of 60th Engineers; SGT Jason Fineberg of HSC; and CPT Kiel Wright, of HSC.

Seahorse Standard (SS): Thank you for joining us. How are you doing today?

SPC Pineda (KP): I am well, thanks. SGT Fineberg (JF): I am doing well.

CPT Wright (KW): I am doing ok, thanks.

SS: How long have you been a part of the 19th Engineer Battalion?

KP: I have been with the 60th Engineer Company, 19th Engineer Battalion since they stood up in November 2006. I am still with the 60th, but we now, fall under the 11th Engineers as of last July.

KW: Over three years. I was with the 60th Engineers for a year as a vertical engineer platoon leader. Then, I moved to HSC

JF: I have been a part of the battalion since May 2007. I spent the first three months with FSC then moved to HSC.

SS: And now attached to the 60th?

JF: yes. I am attached as the senior medic, for the company.

SS: What is your current job? ..and your branch, Sir?

KW: I am an Engineer Officer.

JF: I am the medical NCO/ senior medic.

KP: [I am a] carpentry/masonry engineer.

SS: What roll does your job fulfill?

KP: My platoon built up the motor pool for the Stryker Brigade. As well as their TOC

JF: I ensure that the Soldiers, that are under my care, stay healthy and are given the treatment they need, just incase they fall ill or sustain injury.

KW: I am the plans officer for the battalion. I publish the daily Fragos directing the companies to accomplish missions according to our priorities

SS: Did you deploy with the unit prior to this deployment?

JF: Yes. I deployed with the unit July 2007 to November 2007

KW: Yes I deployed with the unit from 2006 to 2007. I deployed with the 60th to Kirkuk.

KP: Yes, I was deployed with the 60th PSD. I was in Kirkuk, Mosul and Tikrit.

SS: How does this deployment differ from the last one?

KW: I am primarily on staff as opposed to being in a line company.

KP: We had many more convoys in Iraq. Here, we mainly work on the Fob. The living conditions were better in Iraq as well. We had our own rooms from the start. Here, we just moved in to trailers a couple months ago.

JF: The main difference is that I am now an NCO and my role differs from last time. Also, this is my first year long deployment.

SS: Congratulations on your Promotion.

JF: Thank you. It has been a long time coming.

SS: Is this deployment to Afghanistan anything how you imagined it would be?

KW: I thought Iraq smelled bad when it rained but Afghanistan smells bad all the time.

JF: yes, This deployment is going how I imagined it [from the start]. This is my second time, here, in Afghanistan. It is different, however, because last time, I flew in helicopters. This time it has been all on ground.

- KP: I did not expect the Fob to be built up so fast. We have a new DFAC, living trailers, and a PX
- SS: So you think progress is moving faster than expected?
- **KP**: Yes. Even when we have limited supplies, we strive to complete the job.
- SS: What are some things that you have noticed that are going well?
- JF: From what I have seen, we are doing a great job building the structures, that other units need to do their job.
- KP: Soldiers are working hard. There are normal complaints but that is to be expected. Another thing is time is passing a lot faster.
- KW: I think by allowing Soldiers to have a low battle rhythm day, it gives them a weekly opportunity to relieve stress and a time to rest.
- SS: And, now, how about not so well?
- KW: I knew that was coming. I would say the current amount of connectivity limits the operational effectiveness of the battalion.
- **KP**: This is a blackout Fob. There are no lights when the sun goes down. So Operations stop earlier than expected. I also seem to always run into things that I can't see. (laughs)
- JF: Working only on a FOB, I have not seen anything negative for the mission or battalion.
- SS: Has your outlook on this deployment change from the beginning up until now?
- **KP**: Well, I was anticipating this deployment to be like Iraq. It wasn't even close, but it is not so bad now. The pace gave me a good chance to make some really good friends.
- JF: Deployment has went how I expected so far. Every deployment has its ups and down. So the answer is no, my outlook has not changed.
- KW: I think my second deployment is easier because I know what to expect.
- SS: If there was one thing that you could change or improve upon, about this deployment, what would it be?
- JF: I wouldn't change a thing. Looking back on past conflicts, we, now, are better equipped and trained then before. The over all living conditions are a plus.
- KW: I would decrease the time deployed or give Soldiers two un-chargeable breaks. Deployments take a toll on families too.
- **KP**: Um, I would rather be home.. (laughs)
- SS: Well, other than that..
- **KP**: I would like to go outside the Fob walls for missions. Maybe some crater repair and to see more than the Inside of a Fob. Other than work, a bigger PX and more expedient mail service
- SS: Overall, has this deployment been a good experience to date?
- KP: I would say so. I got to see Afghanistan and learn more lessons in life... I also got to build, which was a good experience.
- **KW**: I am always sad to leave my family but one always learns more about themselves on deployment. They provide an opportunity to reassess your priorities and ensure you are working towards accomplishing your goals
- JF: Yes!!
- SS: and being promoted was a part of that?
- JF: yes. That, and the leeway that I was given for leave to go home to see the birth of my son.
- SS: Are there any leaders or colleagues that you would like to recognize?
- **KP**: SPC Potts, SPC Cantwell, PFC Beard, PFC Huggins, and PFC Desselle. They really helped me through. There are many more to thank as well.
- JF: My old platoon leader, 2LT Davis from PSD, my old squad leader SGT Foulkes from PSD, the battalion PA CPT Wampler and the aid station NCOIC SGT Plunkett.
- **KW**: I would like to recognize PFC Valejo Johnson from the S-6 Section, HSC, for taking the initiative to check on my computers and fix them whenever he can
- SS: Do you have any words for Family and friends back home?
- KP: I miss you and can't wait to see you again.
- JF: To my wife, Erin, and my son, Coleman, I love you and I miss you both. Stay strong, I will be home soon.
- KW: I love and miss you. See you soon.
- SS: Thank you for your time. Have a nice day and stay safe.
- KP: Thanks!
- JF: Thank you.
